



## COVID-19 PROTOCOLS

### PYSL WILL FOLLOW STATE AND COUNTY GUIDELINES REGARDING COVID-19

#### Safety Protocols

Masks are not required for participation in PYSL activities, but may be worn by any player or family who desires to do so. Please be respectful of everyone's individual choice regarding their safety.

#### Protocol for A Positive Test:

##### **POSITIVE PLAYER TEST**

If a player tests positive for Covid-19, the player's parents shall immediately contact the player's coach. The coach shall notify their division director and the player's team of any possible exposure while respecting the medical privacy of the player in question.

A player with a positive test may not participate in PYSL activities for 10 days from the date of the positive test unless the following conditions are met:

- 1) The player has no Symptoms
- 2) It has been 5 days since the positive test
- 3) The player has tested negative

ONLY after all of the above conditions are met may a player return to play before the 10 day requirement stated above.

##### **POSITIVE COACH TEST**

If a coach tests positive for Covid-19, the coach shall notify their division director and each team that they coach of any possible exposure.

A coach with a positive test may not participate in PYSL activities for 10 days from the date of the positive test unless the following conditions are met:

- 1) The coach has no Symptoms
- 2) It has been 5 days since the positive test
- 3) The coach has tested negative

ONLY after all of the above conditions are met may a coach return to play before the 10 day requirement stated above.

##### **CLOSE CONTACTS**

If a coach or player has had close contact with someone who is positive, they may continue to participate in league uninterrupted provided that ALL of the following apply:

- 1) They are fully vaccinated (including boosters)
- 2) They have no symptoms

If either #1 or #2 DO NOT apply, then the player or coach in question must quarantine for 10 days from the date of the close contact or the cessation of symptoms, whichever is later.
